SPECIALIST SEN SUPPORT (Wave 3)

This specialist support is for those children who have special educational needs and require personalised provision. This is designed, implemented and reviewed using our best endeavours to meet the child's needs. This support follows an assess, plan, do, review (APDR) cycle in adherence with the Code of Practice. We aim to work closely with other professionals and outside agencies in order to ensure that each child is happy, well supported and making good progress towards agreed targets. Our aim is to always work with the child at the heart of everything we do, alongside a close partnership with parents.

Educational Health Care Plans (EHCPs - wave 4)

An education, health and care (EHC) plan is for children and young people aged up to 25 who need more support than is available through internal SEN school support. EHC plans identify educational, health and social needs and set out the the provision required to meet those needs.

This document sets out the three levels of support available to pupils at Earl Sterndale C of E Primary School.

EFFECTIVE USE OF TAs

- Model, then teach, then support mind mapping or note taking
- Repeat instructions and check understanding
- Occasional scribing
- Encouraging children to make oral contributions to lessons
- Encourage independence and use of all class strategies before asking for adult help.
- Know about the alternatives to written recording

EFFECTIVE USE OF TAs

- Simplify, repeat and break down activities into smaller chunks
- Ensure pupils fully understand their task (“Tell me what you have been asked to do”)
- Promote children’s independence
- Model good language and grammar/correct incorrect grammar or vocabulary
